Offered in partnership with Indiana State Parks, Discover the Outdoors sends Hoosier students on field trips to an Indiana state park or reservoir where they engage with Indiana's natural resources. Through special experiences and lessons, they learn about the park's wildlife, flora, cultural history, and more.

Educators work with property staff to create an experience that allows them to teach classroom lessons outside. Recently, we joined a large group of third graders at Lincoln State Park, where they learned about its history as well as its special connection to Indiana and U.S. history. Meanwhile, students farther north at Prophetstown State Park explored its unique habitat, learning about grasslands, fens, and wildlife.

Each trip helps students discover the natural world around them. For some students, it's the first time they've spent meaningful time at an Indiana DNR property.

Spring is an exciting time of year, especially in Indiana's outdoors. The early blooming wildflowers are showing off; the trees are sprouting with new life; and more Hoosiers are beginning to take to the trails, lakes, rivers, and campgrounds as the crisp mornings are followed with nearly perfect afternoon weather.

While we love each of these things about spring, one of our favorite parts of the changing season is our annual Indiana Tree Project planting. This year, we joined our partners from Huston Solar for their third planting, which was also their second at Prophetstown State Park, to celebrate Arbor Day.

The planting came along with some extra excitement this year after being originally scheduled for fall of 2024. After some wet and cold weather ended the tree planting season early, Huston's team began looking forward to a rescheduled date at the park they're deeply connected to.

"Prophetstown is practically in our backyard, and it's a place where many of our team members spend time with their families camping, biking, or simply enjoying nature," said Cam Smith, Huston's solar division manager, last fall. "To be able to enhance the park's environment through our volunteer efforts makes this project even more special to us."

Huston's volunteers made efficient work of the Arbor Day planting. After adding approximately 3,000 new oak trees to the park, the group enjoyed lunch and took a guided hike on which they learned more about the importance of the work they completed.



Staff at Prophetstown are strategically restoring oak savanna habitat at the park, an ongoing project that these tree plantings directly support. While in the park, the volunteers could see this restoration work in various stages, including on their planting site from 2023.

Thanks to our dedicated partners like Huston, along with generous gifts from individual donors, the Indiana Tree Project continues to expand the state's forests. Through tree plantings and land acquisitions, the program is creating habitat and outdoor recreation opportunities that will benefit Hoosiers for generations to come.
